THE NEED OF VIRTUE

Virtue is a difficult word to define, especially as it is translated from the Greek. It is translated "excellencies" and attributed to God in I Peter 2:9. It is called "virtue" and attributed to Christ in 2 Peter 1:3. It is a quality to be found in Christians (Phil. 4:8; 2 Peter 1:5). But what does it mean? Thayer says it is "any excellence of person (in body or mind)...an eminent endowment, property or quality." It denotes moral goodness or vigor. It suggests then, quality thought that produces quality character.

Pulpit Commentary in its comments on Phil. 4:8 says, "Virtue points to manliness of valor, but is to be taken as inclusive of every form of moral excellence. We are to have the excellence that comes from the true, the honorable, the just, the pure and the lovely." The same book comments on 2 Peter 1:5, "Virtue is manliness, the courage which enables Christians to behave themselves like men in the service of the captain of their salvation. In the midst of the assaults of temptations, we need the resolute determination to do what is right in the sight of God, a steadfast strength to always choose the good part. This is the virtue of the Christian warrior, and that which is acquired in the active work of faith, faith ever working, ever energetic, which strengthens the soul."

Albert Barnes further comments on 2 Peter 1:5, "Here he (Peter) has the Greek word, as referring to manliness, courage, vigor, energy; and the sense is, that he (Peter) wished them to evidence whatever firmness of courage might be necessary in the maintaining the principles of their religion, and enduring the trials to which faith was subjected. It requires great energy and boldness, for its very essence is firmness, manliness and independence."

So many today have faith, but lack the moral courage to act on that faith. They know the life they ought to live but let the magnetic power of sin draw them away. They ought to obey the gospel, but don't know if they can hold out. They know they ought to be faithful in attendance to the assemblies of the saints but lack the spiritual energy to get up and go and not be drawn by the course of lease resistance. They know the immoral climate of the world today is to be abstained from, but the courage to stand against the works of the flesh is absent. So all is lost.
