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THE PLACE OF SAFETY

I knew a man some years ago, one of thousands, who felt assured of his salvation because he occasionally assembled with the saints in the church building. As the worship service began he didn't participate in the singing because he "didn't have the voice." I guess he didn't think of the heart (Eph. 5:19). He had been a "member" of the church for over 30 years, but couldn't lead a prayer. As you might guess his financial contribution was small, again there was a "because," "Because the church has more money in the bank than I have." At the end of the service he departed, not to be seen again for a couple of weeks. One might inquire of his private life, "Was it filled with good works (Titus 2:7, 14)? Not that anyone notices, because he "minded his own business."

If someone asked him, "Are you saved?" the answer was, "Of course. I was baptized years ago and I still go to church." That baptism is required for salvation is an indisputable fact (Gal. 3:26-27; Acts 22:16). Worshipping God with those of like precious faith, exhorting and being exhorted, provoking to love and good works and being provoled are blessings from God. But a one time act of obedience and occasional entrance into a building do not assure one of safety.

We should hesitate to generalize that God's people have always had a problem remembering who and what they were, but the scriptures do reveal to us numerous instances of this problem. Look at Jerusalem during the days of Jeremiah. It was the city of God, and in it was located the temple of God, yet there was no true religion there. The people were circumcised in the flesh (an act of obedience), but not in the heart (Jer. 4:3-4; 6:10; 9:25). They went to the temple, but God doesn't accept worship from idolatrous people.

About a century before the time of Jeremiah the prophet Micah dealt with the same problem. He says in 3:11-12: "The heads thereof judge for reward and the priests thereof teach for hire, and the prophets divine for money: yet they lean upon Jehovah and say, 'Is not Jehovah in the midst of us? no evil shall come upon us.' Therefore shall Zion for your sake be plowed as a field, and Jerusalem shall become heaps..." Their attitude was that nothing could happen to them because they had priests, prophets and a temple. God sent destruction to teach them the folly of trusting in earthly structures and systems. For our time and purpose we need to remember that buildings and offices do not necessarily constitute a church recognized by the Lord.

Where is the place of safety? For the people of Jeremiah's day safety wasn't in the timple, but in the Lord. The same is true for us. Safety isn't in a building, but in the true church, a body of working saints. "For we are God's fellow-workers; ye are God's husbandry, God's building" (I Cor. 3:9). Being in a building isn't the same as being in the Lord. The people of God weren't just called Christians, they are Christians, and there is a vast difference.

Who are we? Christians - followers, imitators of Christ. What are we? Strangers, sojourners, pilgrims - we're not earthly residents, we're just passing through. Don't try carrying too much cumbersome baggage. Remember to help others along the way. Where are we going? To heaven. Let nothing deter or distract us.
