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RESPECTABLE WORLDLINESS

The most common use of "worldliness" conveys the idea of overt sin-lying, drunkenness, adultery, etc. The Bible explicitly condemns such a life. "Ye adulterers and adulteresses, know ye not that the friendship of the world is enmity with God? Whosoever therefore will be a friend of the world is the enemy of God" (James 4:4).

Another kind of worldliness, however, is just as prevalent, but is not as easily recognized as the enemy of God. It is the kind of worldliness which is "respectable," for only good things are done (i.e., things that are not considered overt sin). This kind of worldliness involves our jobs, family, recreation, education. All of these material blessings have a proper place in our lives, but each one of them can become sinful if we attach more importance to them than to the service of God (Matt. 6:33).

In a world as "busy" as ours and as "prosperous" as ours, Christians must constantly gurad against crowding the Lord out. We may not be drunkards, liars, adulterers, and wouldn't be found in their constant company. But when our lives become so involved with wholesome activities that Christ is pushed aside from the center of our heart, then we are engaged in "respectable" worldliness. How often do we day, "I don't have time...?" We are too busy earning wages, enjoying ball games, or visiting friends, consequently we no longer have time to study and teach the Bible, attend services, visit the sick or restore the fallen. We mean no harm; in fact we say we love the Lord, but our lives demonstrate a misplaced affection.

The blessings of this great nation have become a curse to the spirituality of the church. Take a look at ourselves. We have no time to attend Bible study, we prefer a "sermonette" during the time set aside for teaching. We drive several miles to attend a ball game, but cannot go across town to attend a gospel meeting. We hardly blink an eye at the debt we assume in order to buy a new car or boat, but when it comes to giving to the Lord we look to see "what we can afford."

Respectsable wordliness has given us a "ho-hum" attitude to its own evil because it seems good. We all know the drunkard and the liar are doomed to hell unless they repent. We can take "hard" preaching on these topics. But who believes a man will be lost because he worked too many hours making an "honest living" for his family? Will we be condemned for relaxing with family or friends? or for buying a big screen TV?

The answer to these questions is found in the parable Jesus taught in Luke 14:16-24. The people who were forbidden to taste the great supper did not commit any overt act of sin. They were lost over a piece of ground, five yoke of oxen and a new wife. The lesson is simple. Put God first! "For what is a man profitted if he would gain the whole world but lose his own soul? What shall a man give in exchange for his soul?" (Matt. 16:26)
